

Hygienic Lab. Internships can take place during the fall, spring or summer semesters, and may be paid or unpaid. Interns can receive a notation on their transcript or

course credit for work completed at UHL while gaining valuable lab experience. Many UHL internships require a minimum of 10 hours a week for eight weeks in the summer, and 10 weeks during the fall and spring. Jobs

must be 80 percent professional work.



practicum experience, including a final written report and oral presentation, constitutes the final examination for course work within a university college, such as the College of Public Health or the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences. The practicum may be funded and approved for course credit.



ellowships provide students (generally postsecondary) an opportunity to apply the technologies, methods and practices related to their field of expertise in a professional environment. The fellow is assigned to a particular project,

with some assignments lasting as long as two years. UHL participates in the Emerging Infectious Diseases Fellowship program sponsored by the Association of Public Health Laboratories and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.
